	<p>The coat of arms contains three golden maple leaves. Historically, gold maple leaves represented Ontario, while green maple leaves represented Quebec.</p>		<p>A white cross and a white fleur-de-lis in each quadrant. The fleurs-de-lis is a symbol of the Kingdom of France.</p>
	<p>A blue St Andrew's Cross on a white field is a reversal of the Scottish flag, with the coat of arms of Scotland .</p>		<p>The flag shows an ancient galley, symbolizing the maritime province's links to the sea.</p>
	<p>The coat of arms shows a bison, a symbol of First Nations peoples who derived food from bisons.</p>		<p>The flag features a golden sun setting into the ocean, representing the province's location on the Pacific.</p>
	<p>The flag depicts three oak saplings, representing the Island's three counties, beneath a mature oak that represents Britain.</p>		<p>The flag shows a western red lily, the provincial flower. The coat of arms shows three gold sheaves of wheat.</p>
	<p>The coat of arms depicts the Rocky Mountains, grass prairies and wheat fields – representing Alberta's landscape.</p>		<p>Blue, white and red represent water, snow and human effort. The design resembles the Union Jack, a reminder of historic connections with Britain.</p>
	<p>Gold billets in the green portion and the mask of the white fox represent minerals and fur.</p>		<p>The lower part of the shield represents Yukon's mountains and rivers. Atop the shield is an Alaskan Malamute dog.</p>
	<p>An inuksuk is a type of stone landmark or cairn built and used by Inuit.</p>
